# SC Synod Assembly 2026 Summary



The 2026 South Carolina Synod Assembly was held at Brookland Baptist Church in Columbia SC June 11,12 and 13. Attended by Delegates Rod Davis, Bill Dukes, Trina Free, Virginia Herlong and Pastor Ron Philabaum.

The primary vision is for a synod characterized by unity, inclusivity, and courage, inspired by biblical figures such as Paul and Solomon.

The aim is to be a welcoming church that embraces all people each equal children of God, and to be ready to answer the call to serve the wider world. The importance of facing challenges with collective wisdom and maintaining love and respect despite differences was highlighted.

We had 394 voting delegates in attendance and 40 visitors. The reports from all our supported ministries were inspiring and the far-reaching impacts made witnessed to the fruits of their labor. The harvest is plentiful and we need more laborers to join in the joy of the ministry.

A significant challenge discussed is the shortage of rostered leaders and open positions in congregations. A strategy proposed is to quicken and improve the candidacy process for new leaders. Utilizing synodically authorized preachers to fill immediate needs.

Recognition that growth is possible with creative thought, communication, and leveraging available resources. A strong

desire to build stronger partnerships with Lutheran organizations and colleges, retreat centers and service providers was emphasized. There is a focus on ensuring all congregations, especially those on the periphery, feel included and supported.

Promoting interconnectivity between churches through technology and intentional communication. To encourage ministry growth and innovation the Synod is looking into diverse ministry approaches tailored to local needs, while maintaining shared mission. Use of technology and administrative skills to fund and grow ministries.

An example was shared from Mount Tabor Lutheran, which set and surpassed a goal of 150 new members in three years through intentional growth strategies and new connection points.

Commitment to standing firm against external challenges and defending the church's mission and resisting outside division from



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the Great Commission that we are all called to. Emphasis on not being intimidated, but rather communicating and supporting each other.

Where we can stand in support is to give testimony to the impacts of the work that the SC Synod is doing through each church in South Carolina. We are stronger together than a part and each of us are making a collective impact to celebrate. These are great coffee table talking points to be excited about and to tell the good news that Jesus is doing through all of us, not just individually.

We are one in the Spirit We Are One in the Lord, and we pray that all unity will one day be restored, and they'll know we are Christians by our love, yes they'll know we are Christians by our love.

Following the announcement of retirement from our Bishop Ginny Aebischer, elections were held to elect a new Bishop for a six-year term. There were 77 names submitted by ecclesiastical ballot. The names narrowed over 4 ballots, and by the 5th Pastor Wade Roof of Mt. Tabor in Columbia was elected to serve the SC Synod. His term begins in September of 2026. Please pray for Bishop Elect Roof as we look forward to his leadership.

# Lutheran Men in Mission

## Focusing on Faith, Fellowship and Service

MAY 11 – The Lutheran Men in Mission enjoyed a presentation on Safe Stress by Sarah Dippity of SCHEMA.ORG.

The program was based on the book, “Men are from Mars, Women are from Venus.”



JUNE 8 – Pastor Jim Kinsler entertained the Lutheran Men, recounting his adventures on the Appalachian Trail.



The Appalachian Trail (AT) turned 100 years old in 2025. This 2,197-mile footpath follows the peaks and valleys of the Appalachian Mountains from Springer Mountain in Georgia to Katahdin in Maine. The fastest known time (FKT) to traverse the entire length of the “AT” was set in 2024 by Tara Dowler (trail name, Candy Mama). She finished the trail in 40 days and 18 hours.

Pastor Jim Kinsler, retired pastor of Lutheran Church By The Lake, (trail name, SLOWjourner) is working on the slowest known time (SKT). He started hiking the AT before he graduated high school in 1973. He reached Katahdin on August 19th in 2025, but he is still not finished! As he explains, “I only have 70 miles left to hike, and there is no rush because the erosion of the Appalachian mountains is even slower than I am.”

The Lutheran men will not meet in July. The annual Fish Fry Meeting will be on Monday, August 10, at 6:30 p.m. All men and women are invited.

On August 20, the Mt. Horeb Men will host the meeting of the Lutheran Men in Mission of the Heartland Conference.

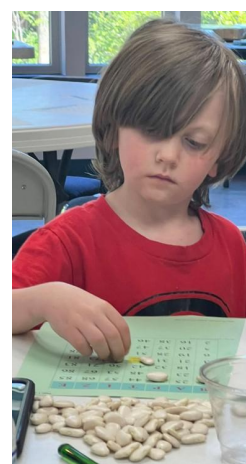
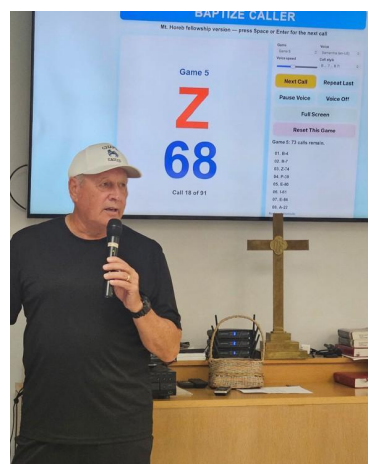
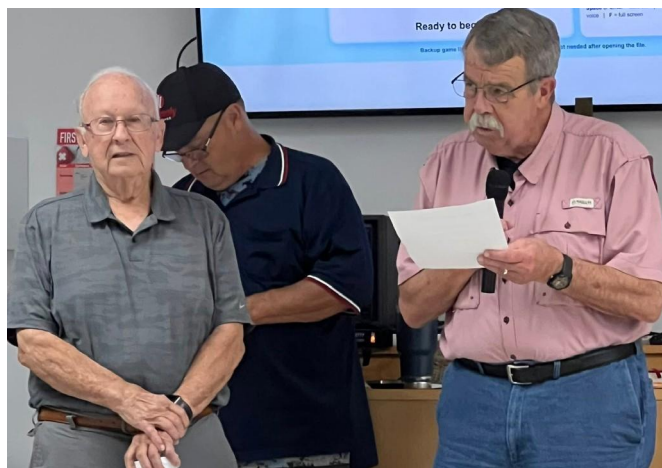
## MAY 16 – Outside Cleanup Day

# Cemetery Committee Report

GIS Mapping Team Update – During the month of May, the GIS Mapping Team continued refining the cemetery GIS map by updating grave sites and reserved plot information to ensure the accuracy of our records. The team also discussed procedures for site reservations and is working to develop clear, consistent policies and documentation.

These documents and procedures will be further refined and reviewed over the coming months to support effective cemetery planning and administration.

Mt. Horeb Cemetery Historical Designation Update: The Historical Architectural Resources Survey commissioned by the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) for the Columbia Avenue Improvement Project evaluated whether properties affected by the proposed road widening and improvement project were eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

After reviewing 44 properties within the project area, the survey determined that the Mt. Horeb Lutheran Church Cemetery Wall was the only resource found eligible for

potential National Historic designation. As a result of this determination, the Mt. Horeb Cemetery Team is now working with the Chapin Historical Association to begin the formal nomination process. This process requires extensive historical research, documentation, photographs, mapping, and

preparation of a detailed nomination package that demonstrates the wall's historical significance and integrity.

The nomination must also be reviewed by the appropriate state preservation authorities before it can be forwarded for consideration at the national level. This process is being funded by a grant from the Chapin Historical Association. If successfully listed, National Register designation would recognize the historical importance of the cemetery wall, and could create opportunities to pursue preservation grants, endowments, and other funding sources to assist with its long-term maintenance and conservation.

The designation would also help preserve an important part of Mt. Horeb's heritage for future generations while honoring those who are buried within its historic grounds.

The Cemetery Team will continue to keep the congregation informed as work on the nomination progresses and appreciates the support of members and the community throughout this important preservation effort

# Cemetery GIS Report

Over the past year, our cemetery committee has been compiling data and records to create a spatial database, GIS, for our cemetery. This process is nearing completion with all of the known graves entered in GIS. This information includes the occupied graves as well as those reserved by others for future burial.

This information can be viewed on the Mt. Horeb website under the tab “about us” and following the link to “cemetery.” The cemetery is shown with basic outlines of grave sites and reserved grave spaces with the colors representing the status of the grave.

Graves that are designated as “Occupied,” “Reserved,” or “Veteran” can be found using the search tool that is shown on the screen. By typing in a name, the system will search records for matches and highlight the selected grave.

Many gravesites are reserved in our records, but some confusion is encountered because of our past record keeping. “Plots” were reserved by families, but individual graves

were not assigned to a specific family member.

A lot of work has been done to create the GIS and the system is usable today. Until individual grave details are specified, the possibility of undue stress on families exists. In the coming months, we would like to dig

into these specifics and get our GIS into the robust system our congregation deserves.
